

Frequently Asked Questions about the Changes in the Continuing Forestry Education program and the Certified Forester Program

Has the SAF changed the way that Continuing Education credits are assigned?

Yes, the SAF has really tightened up on these credits. There are new requirements for the providers of training, as well as the CFE Coordinator, and on you – the attendee. Now, the provider must apply for credits ahead of time and report attendance back to the national office. The CFE Coordinator is required to provide new forms to providers, may no longer evaluate courses offered by their employer or organization, and must attend annual training. You, as an attendee, will receive a certificate of attendance at approved courses/ workshops, and may update your training records online at www.safnet.org

Who is the CFE Coordinator for the State of Michigan? For the National Office?

Michigan's CFE Coordinator is Debra Huff (<u>huffd@mi.gov</u>) and the National Office contact for CFE is Louise Murgia (murgial@safnet.org) or Pat Cillay (cillayp@safnet.org).

Where can I get information about becoming a Certified Forester, or maintaining my Certified Forester status? There is extensive information about the Certified Forester program at http://www.certifiedforester.org

How do I take the Certified Forester exam?

First you must apply to the Certified Forester program then take the required exam. Once approved, an individual has one-year to pass the exam. Extensions may be granted.. The exam is administered through Schroeder Measurement Technologies Inc. (SMT) at hundreds of testing centers throughout the US. To locate a testing center near you, visit SMT's (<u>http://www.smttest.com/</u>) and click on "find a test-ing center" under quick links. They will schedule individuals at their testing sites at a time that is convenient for the you. There is no limit on the number of times an exam may be taken. There is a fee to take the exam.

How does SAF manage the Certified Forester and the Continuing Forestry Education programs?

The Certification Review Board (CRB) oversees and audits Certified Forester program implementation, evaluates and periodically reviews program processes and procedures, and makes recommendations as needed to the SAF Council on program guidelines and standards. The CRB investigates questionable compliance and other concerns regarding certification and recertification and serves as the initial appellate body on eligibility decisions. Except for revocation for nonpayment of fees (upon which SAF staff may act), only the Board may revoke or suspend certification once granted. The Board consists of eight Certified Forester volunteers representing a diversity of forest resources employers and geographic regions, and one public member.

How do I maintain my Certified Forester Status?

To maintain the CF certification, an individual must:

 $\cdot\,$ continue to comply with the CF Standards of Professional Practice;

 \cdot accumulate 60 continuing forestry education (CFE) contact hours over a three year period

• pay applicable renewal and recertification fees.

Council Update By: Greg Russell, CF Council Member, District 5

Council met on March 8 & 9, 2008 in Bethesda, MD. Key SAF staff and all council members were present for the meeting.

President Thompson gave an update on the council subcommittees and their assigned members, which are as follows: Executive Committee - Pres. T. Thompson, V.P. B. Hubbard, Past Pres. J. McMahon, Dist 10 councilmember J. Roberson, Dist 2 councilmember J. Lydick, Dist 11 councilmember J. Davis, and E.V.P. M. Goergen; Finance & Investment -- J. Roberson, R. Dziengeleski (Dist 6), C. Seeley (Dist 2), and M. Goergen; Strategic Action: R. Weaver (Dist 9), R. Brevig (Dist 4), J. Davis, b. Hubbard & M. Goergen; Cultural Diversity: K. David (Dist 1), J. Lydick, Joann Cox (Dist 8); Student Governance: J. Roberson, R. Brevig, K. David, S. Purviss (Student Rep.); Membership: M. Coulombe (Dist 7), G. Russell (Dist 5), R. Dziengeleski, J. Roberson. National Standing Committees & Task Forces and their members can be found on the SAF website.

Council reviewed and approved actions taken by the Executive Committee and E.V.P. since the last council meeting. These actions consisted of 7 letters written to members of Congress and the Senate, as well as a joint letter to the Office of Government Ethics. Three of the letters concerned the lack of inclusion of forest biomass in the legal definitions of renewable biomass in the Energy independence and Security Act of 2007. Other letters covered SAF's response to the BLM's Western Oregon Plan Revision, the Forest Landscape Restoration Act, and climate change legislation. The letter to the Gov't Ethics Office was to gain support for gov't employees to be allowed to fully participate in Professional Societies. This letter was signed by SAF and 12 other natural resource professional societies. Conflicting interpretations of the current law make it difficult for many Federal Agency personnel to fully participate in organizations such as SAF. Efforts are under way by SAF and others to get legislation passed that would de-criminalize violations of this act for those participating in their professional societies.

Activities of the National Staff were also presented to Council. The major highlight of their activities is securing low cost liability insurance for SAF field trips and outdoor activities (quotes from carriers are still coming is). If your Society or Chapter is planning an outdoor field trip or other activity, be sure to contact the National Office to see if an insurance rider is needed or not. Some activities won't require a rider, and some will, SO CHECK FIRST! Chapters can check directly with the National Office, without going through the State Society Chair. The annual Audit was also presented and accepted by Council. Financial Officer, Larry Burner needs the Tax ID # of the State Society & Chapters, so he can have a readily available list handy in case he needs to respond to inquiries concerning tax exempt issues from the IRS. **Please get those Tax ID #'s to Larry ASAP.** In other financial maters, the Forest Science & Technology Board is seeking contributions to the SAF Science Fund. This fund is used to provide technical & scientific programs and projects to all levels of SAF. It was noted that this fund raising effort could be in direct competition with the Foresters Fund. Many felt that since the purpose of each fund is independent of the other, that the conflict should be minimal. Allegheny SAF recently contributed \$1,000+ to the fund.

Council renewed 3 SAF Position Statements that were set to expire in 2008, and delayed action on one other. Position Statements that were renewed are related to: 1) Clear-cutting, 2) Protecting Endangered Species Habitat on Private Lands, and 3) Public Regulation of Private Forest Land. The decision on the Position Statement on Professionalism in Natural Resource Management agencies was delayed so it can be further reviewed. Nadine Block. Chair of the Committee on Forest Policy, also presented Council with two key policy issues that will be addressed this year: Climate Change and Wildfire Management. The Task Force on Climate Change presented their Draft Report to Council for discussion. The report examines the current literature & research as it relates to Forest Managements role in mitigating climate change and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. The final report is expected to be available by late April. The FSTB and CFP anticipate that the report may result in four Position Statements covering: 1) market Based Carbon Trading Policies, 2) GHG Emissions, 3) Wildfire Mitigation, and 4) Biofuels. If you have ideas or concerns about any of the above, contact either Bill Rockwell or Nadine Block.

Council received a report from the Task force on Forest Technology School Accreditation. This action took place after I had left the meeting to catch my flight back to MN. The report was met with a general approval of their recommendations but report was not "accepted" as it was sent back to incorporate a report from Educational Policy Review Committee (EPRC) and a feed back report from the Deans of the schools.

Concerning membership issues, Council approved a status change to an annual award. The Outstanding communicator Award was added to the By-Laws, thus making it an Official annual Award, as opposed to its previous status as a discretionary award. The name of the Award was also changed to the W.D. Hagenstein Outstanding communicator Award in honor of Mr. Hagenstein, who has been an active promoter of SAF and Forestry for over seven decades.

Council also *unanimously* recommends that SAF members approve as amendment to the SAF Constitution that would give all member categories full voting rights at all levels of SAF. In addition it would also reduce the number of member categories to the following: Professional, Conditional Professional, Associate, Technician, & Student. The change would also grant all member categories to serve as Officers at the State (Division) and Chapter Levels, reserving national level office and Fellow status for Professional Members only. Citizenship requirements would also be removed for all member categories. Look for the proposed amendment in SAF publications in the near future.

Revisions to the Minimum Standard By-Laws for state societies was also reviewed and accepted by Council. The changes mainly reflect to opportunity for electronic balloting in State Society & Chapter elections. These changes will need to be incorporated into your by-laws the next time other changes are made to them, or sooner if so desired. The complete Minimum Standards can now be viewed on the SAF website.

The Communication Committee has been tasked with developing a strategy & framework for cooperating with other stakeholders/natural resource organizations to get the word out on the importance of properly managing our forest resources. They will be looking outside the "box" to better communicate the importance of forestry to Americans and the world as a whole. The Membership committee will be working with the communications Committee to inform members of the results from the member survey as well as proposed actions in response to the findings of the survey.

Finally, Council was updated on the progress of two projects. The National Convention, set for Nov. 4-7, planning committee reported that the Reno program is coming together nicely. Over 250 abstracts have been submitted for the 220 presentation slots allotted for the convention program. The convention will be held in one location, thus reducing the need for commuting from various lodging establishments. Watch the Forestry Source & JOF for future updates and information. Secondly, the Leadership Academy is scheduled for April 26-29 in Potomac, MD. There are plenty of spots still open for this excellent training. The cost is very good, \$125 tuition, and room & meals for \$195 per night. If you have any inclination toward a leadership role in SAF or any other Volunteer Organization, I strongly encourage you to participate in this academy. Almost all of this years' council members have gone through the Academy in the past. President Thompson feels so strongly that leadership development is important that he revamped the Leadership Academy Committee into the SAF Leadership Development Committee. This 9member committee will be guiding efforts to enhance & entice members to move into leadership roles within SAF.
