FOREST STEWARDSHIP WORKSHOP SERIES

Part 1: October 27 - 29 workshop participants will become familiar with forest management planning, gain an understanding of Circle Pines Center goals for their 294 acres of property, calculate acreages for each forested and nonforested stand, and will assist forester Rick McAvinchey in sampling the trees and other vegetation in the various stands throughout the property. There will be instruction in using aerial photos and compass to navigate around the property. Tree, shrub and smaller plant identification will be a large part of this sampling process.

Part 2: November 10 - 12 participants will take the data gathered in the first workshop, and plug that information into a forest management plan for the property. We will discuss how to develop silvicultural prescriptions for different forest types, how to modify timber production prescriptions to improve habitat for wildlife and to accommodate threatened or endangered species, and how to protect streams, lakes and wetlands during timber harvest operations. Also on Saturday, Trevor Newman of Roots to Fruits in Clarkston will introduce us to principles of Permaculture as management options for Circle Pines Center. If time allows, we will schedule activities over the next decade or longer within the plan.
