Greg Corace

Greg Corace is Refuge Forester, Seney National Wildlife Refuge. Greg's major duties at Seney NWR include the formulation and establishment of Refuge land management goals and objectives, primary management responsibility for Kirtland's Warbler Wildlife Management Area (6,500 acres across northern Lower Michigan), and primary contact for-and initiator of-Refuge research pertaining to upland ecosystems.

In meeting these duties, Greg has coordinated systematic forest surveys and inventories to determine areas in need of restoration within the context of neotropical bird conservation and has conducted on-the-ground stand-level forest restoration treatments for the same.

He has also worked extensively with fire and habitat management plans for the future preservation, protection, and enhancement of Refuge ecosystems and has functioned as Refuge contact with numerous cooperators from academia, other State and Federal agencies, and other offices of the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Greg has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Zoology (Northern Michigan University), a Master of Science in Biology (Northern Michigan University, East African freshwater crab taxonomy and systematics), and is completing his Ph.D. research in openland bird biogeography and conservation biology (Michigan Technological University).
