Gus is a retired northern hardwood research forester, after 32+ years of U.S. Government Service. He studied

preforestry in Wisconsin and got his Masters degree in forest science at the University of Montana. He began his career as a trail builder and fire lookout in Plains, Montana and fought fires as a smoke jumper out of Missoula in 1953, '57, and '59. From 1960 to 1966 Gus worked as a silviculture researcher in hardwood plantation management in Ames, Iowa. From 1966 to retirement in 1989, he served as a research forester in management of second-growth northern hardwoods in Northern Michigan and Wisconsin. Since his retirement, he has managed some hardwood stands for Fred Prince's Forests for the Future and for small forest woodland owners who are managing their forests to leave to their children.

Landscape Structure, Composition, and Change in the Upper Lake States: Implications for Forest

Dr. Brosofske is a Research Assistant Professor in the School of Forest Resources and Environmental Science at Michigan Technological University. Her research focuses on the spatial ecology of landscapes, especially within disturbed land mosaics of the Upper Great Lakes Region. Dr. Brosofske received a B.S. from the University of Michigan in Natural Resources, an M.S. in Forestry from Michigan Tech University, and a PhD in Forest Science, also from Michigan Tech. She then spent two years as a faculty member at the University of Rhode Island before deciding to return to the Northwoods. Dr. Brosofske is currently working with US Forest Service personnel in Rhinelander, Wisconsin, to quantify the ecological and social landscape factors influencing modern fire regimes and to identify changes in vegetation and disturbance regimes from pre-European settlement to modern times in National Forests of the Eastern Region.

Well known to most foresters in the Upper Peninsula and across Michigan, Bob is the Forest Pest & Exotic Pest Management Program Leader for the Michigan DNR. He

Today, Christel will talk about the original cutting methods study started in 1926 at Dukes Experimental Forest.

Christel Kern is a forester at the USDA Forest Service, Northern Research Station. She received both her bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Wisconsin – Stevens Point. In 2000, she moved to Olympia, Washington to work for the Pacific Northwest Research Station. There, she worked on oak release, plantation microclimate, and long term growth and yield studies. For four years, she was primarily involved with red pine research of long term productivity and retention harvesting. During her time in Grand Rapids, she also was certified in silviculture in cooperation with the Chippewa National Forest. Her dissertation research will pick up on retired silviculturist, Terry Strong's, Canopy Gap Study in northern Wisconsin.
