# What is the Forest Stewardship Program?

- Core Purpose:
  - help landowners manage, protect, and enjoy their forest
- Connections:
  - landowners with a professional forester
  - to develop a Forest Stewardship Plan
  - to help landowners achieve their personal goals for their land

  - Many others....








Frost Middle School in Livonia – the first Forest Stewardship Plan in Wayne County!


# How to develop a Forest Stewardship Plan?

- 1. Call several foresters
- 2. Walk in the woods with your forester
- 3. Fill out the easy 2 page application
- 4. Give input to your forester
- 5. Review the plan
  - goals, inventory, recommendations



- 6. Forester submits plan to DNR for review and cost share payment
- 7. Implement your Forest Stewardship Plan– fun work in the woods!

## **Benefits of Investing in a Forest Stewardship Plan**

- Manage
  - Lower your property taxes
  - Financial assistance to implement conservation practices
  - Plan your next timber harvest to optimize profits
  - Lower your capital gains taxes during the next timber sale
- Protect
  - Improve your forest with a timber sale rather than degrade it
  - Forest health issues like insects, disease, invasive plants
  - Best Management Practices to protect soil & water resources
  - Fire prevention, carbon sequestration, important sites
- Enjoy!
  - Wildlife habitat for hunting & viewing
  - Aesthetics
  - Trails for recreation
  - Forest management is FUN!

#### • Grant Projects

- Training Foresters to Enhance the Management of Private Forest Land
  - Partnership with NRCS to train public and private sector foresters
- Landscape Stewardship Plans
  - The Nature Conservancy, Huron Pines, The Stewardship Network
- Reducing Runoff in the Dead River Watershed
  - Superior Watershed Partnership is planting 2,500 trees in Marquette

## What is Forest Stewardship?

Forest stewardship is ...

- intentional human *activities*
- performed in accordance with your *plan*
- to accomplish your broad *goals* and specific objectives
- that *improve* your forest for the following generations

Forest stewardship is ...

- a *long-term* process
- guided by forestry *science* and environmental *ethics*
- to become a better *manager* of your forest



"Your woodlot is, in fact, a historical document that faithfully records your personal philosophy. Let it tell a story of tolerance toward living things, and of skill in the greatest arts: how to use the earth without making it ugly." (Aldo Leopold, 1937 radio address)

## **Two Options for Forest Management Plans**

- Forest Stewardship Program
  - Partial cost share is "\$225 + \$0.50/acre up to \$2,500"
    - \$245 for 40 acres, \$265 for 80 acres (total fees much higher)
  - Cost share and plans are available all year
  - <u>www.michigan.gov/foreststewardship</u>
- Natural Resources Conservation Service
  - Financial assistance is much higher
    - \$624 for <50 acres and \$884 for 50-100 acres
  - Financial assistance is distributed at limited times

## So How Does a Landowner Choose?

- Professional:
  - Who do you want to work with? Do they share your management philosophy?
  - Consulting forester? Or procurement forester? or wildlife biologist?
  - Costs and quality of work <u>vary greatly</u> among forest management plan writers
    - interview several foresters ask for references and a previous plan to review
- Program:
  - What program is best for you and your forest?
  - Do you want a plan that barely meets minimum requirements or greatly exceeds requirements?
- Timing:
  - What are the deadlines for program applications?
    - Commercial Forest application deadline is April 1 for benefits in the following year
    - Qualified Forest application deadline is September 1 for benefits in the following year
  - NRCS sign up period for the year ends in the spring and contracts not available until late summer
  - Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) cost share is available all year
- Cost:
  - FSP has average cost share, and easy to obtain through your plan writer
  - NRCS has high cost share, but more effort for landowner to obtain a contract with government
  - Tree Farm plan can be free, but you get what you pay for...
  - CF and QF have different fees (one time vs annual) and very different tax benefits
