The perils of poor communication can be high, but the rewards when understanding your audience and thoroughly conveying your message can be even higher. The goal of this conference is to hear from professionals who have seen communication between individuals in the forestry community at its best, and at its worst. They will provide ideas and recommendations that can be used not only in your career, but in your personal lives as well. We will hear from leaders of numerous certification programs, natural resource work groups, members of local law enforcement, and individuals who study the science of communication. How do you talk a landowner out of doing something unethical? How do you convince the public that trees should be cut or conserved? How do you discern which certifications are appropriate? Have you ever felt like you could have negotiated something better? We've invited people from all sectors of the forestry community to help answer these questions and we want to hear your input! Join us and learn what they have to say.

Topics for Discussions

- How does the public (landowners) perceive forestry now and in the future?
- What can social media do for your company?
- How do you approach strangers in the woods?
- How can you be sure to benefit during interviews? negotiations?
- What are key words or 'buzz' words to ignore when discussing potentially contentious issues, such as climate change?

From September 2010 to June 2014, Matt was the Director of Operations for the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (AFWA), which represents North America's fish and wildlife agencies in advancing sound, science-based management and conservation of fish and wildlife and their habitats in the public interest. While with the Association, Matt served as policy advisor to the National Fish Habitat Partnership and worked to es-

tablish the National Fish Habitat Fund, the charitable arm of the partnership.

Previously, Matt served as Executive Director of the National Estuarine Research Reserve Association (NERRA) which represents the state agencies and universities that operate the nation's 27 estuarine research reserves in partnership with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). From 2000 through 2008, Matt was President/CEO of the Paddlesports Industry Association, a trade association representing the manufacturers, retailers, and outfitters of canoes, kayaks, and rafts. Additional experience includes nearly seven years with NOAA. Matt has served on the boards of the American Canoe Association, Paddler Magazine, and the International Whitewater Hall of Fame.

Matt has a bachelor's degree in political science and a master's degree in marine policy from the University of Delaware, his home state. Dr. Jim Cantrill received his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois – Urbana in 1985 and has authored or co-edited four books, 13 text chapters, 23 journal articles, 14 technical papers for agencies and institutions, and more than 50 con-

ference papers more-or-less related to environmental communication and natural resource policy. He has developed a reputation as an international expert on environmental communication and, along with colleagues from around the world, was instrumental in the creation of conservation psychology as a distinct disciplinary focus in the social sciences. Consulting for organizations such as the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the National Park Service, and the Brazilian government, he has also received grant funding from a range of sources including the U.S. Forest Service, the Great Lakes National Program Office, and the Michigan DEQ. Partially in recognition of his scholarship, Jim was selected as the President of the Environmental Communication Division of the National Communication and received the Distinguished Faculty Award from Northern in 2001 and an Excellence in Scholarship award from the same institution in 2009.

She also looks at the impact of economic trade on the sustainability of these systems, the so-called "leakage" effect, and its impact on local ecosystems, the "boomerang" effect. Finally, she is interested in using economic incentive policies and landscape-scale management tools to safeguard forest ecosystem services, commonly referred to as "payment for ecosystem services" (PES). Her training and experience is multidisciplinary, split between ecology and policy, as well as some natural resource economics. Audrey has a doctorate from the University of Tennessee and has conducted field work in the coastal sage scrub in southern California, the Florida Everglades, urbanized watersheds in Cincinnati, protected natural areas throughout the Midwest, and the boreal forest in Finland and Russia.
