Forestry Road Building Exemptions and the Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Program

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Part 91 regulates soil erosion and off-site sedimentation of "earth change" activities.

The primary goal of Part 91 is to protect adjacent properties and waters of the state from sediment generated from unchecked erosion. "Earth Change" is a human-caused change in the natural cover or topography of the land that temporarily leads to bare unstable soils.

Includes removing vegetation and grading land for construction of buildings, roads, ponds, road stream crossings, sea walls, etc.

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324.9115 Logging, mining, or land plowing or tilling; permit exemption; "mining" defined.

Sec. 9115. (1) Subject to subsection (2), a person engaged in the logging industry, the mining industry, or the plowing or tilling of land for the purpose of crop production or the harvesting of crops is not required to obtain a permit under this part. However, all earth changes associated with the activities listed in this section shall conform to the same standards as if they required a permit under this part. The exemption from obtaining a permit under this subsection does not include either of the following:

- (a) Access roads to and from the site where active mining or logging is taking place.
- (b) Ancillary activities associated with logging and mining.

Part 303 Exempt Activities for Forestry Section 30305.2: Specific Uses

(j) Construction or maintenance of farm roads, forest roads, or temporary roads for moving mining or forestry equipment, if the roads are constructed and maintained in a manner to assure that any adverse effect on the wetland will be otherwise minimized.

***To meet the exemption the primary purpose must be to move commercial forestry equipment.

Do you require a road for this work?

If an access route/road is planned, then use BMPs to minimize impacts:

- Clearing Access Routes
 - Width of road minimized for vehicles expected to travel the road
 - Narrowest location across sensitive area
 - Straight shot to minimize impact
 - Connecting uplands by minimizing wetlands impacts
 - Straddling wetlands (similar to above)
 - Utilize one pass in and out Single lanes in wetlands and utilize pullouts and passing lanes in uplands
 - Utilize existing routes whenever possible
