## What Do We Mean By "Tenure"?



### **Tenure**

- legal term a mode of holding lands in subordination to a superior.
- Business relationship among society (government), public forest resource and forest resource industry



## Historical: Mid-1800s









## Early 1900s:

- Ontario government aspired to use new wood pulping and paper making industry as lever to develop northern Ontario
- Pulp and paper industry required massive infrastructure development
- Capitalization/financing required guaranteed supply of pulpwood
- "Pulpwood Agreements" negotiated to assure supply














## Historical: 1940s



### 1940s:

- Royal Commission of Enquiry (Kennedy)
  - 72 recommendations
  - "Modernized" forest management in Ontario; harvest based on sustained yield
  - Management plans to be based on science, written by professionals, approved by government
  - Industry more closely regulated


## Historical: 1950s



- Crown Timber Act (1952)
  - Company Management Units
    - Companies conducted forest operation activities
    - Government prepared timber management plans, funded silviculture, forest protection, compliance monitoring
  - Crown Management Units
    - Government prepared *timber* management plans
       + conducted forest operations activities.

## Historical: 1950s - 1990s



- Crown Timber Act (1952)
  - Company Management Units
  - Crown Management Units
  - 1980s Forest Management Agreements
    - Companies prepared *timber* management plans, conducted forest operations activities
    - Government approved plans and funded road building, silviculture, forest protection, monitored compliance

### Current



- Crown Forest Sustainability Act (1995)
  - Sustainable Forest Licence (SFL)
    - Increased responsibility (and cost) on industry
    - Companies prepare *forest* management plans (substantially more depth than timber mgt plans), conduct forest operations, absorb cost for roads.
    - Government approves plans, monitors compliance, funds silviculture (trust funds), forest protection (and recently funds portion of road construction)
    - Independent Forest Audits

**Policy Implementation** – Public interest aspects of forest mgt.


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
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### **Future Considerations**



- Role of Aboriginal communities

- Increase role for competitive market in wood fibre distribution
- Impacts on international trade agreements

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
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- Does current system optimize social, economic, environmental value?
